## Update on Van Transportation for Groceries

I spoke with Dave Butterfield of Trade Winds about the rumors of a van to transport people from Milo to Dover Foxcroft to do their shopping while the old IGA is being transformed. Mr. Butterfield informed me that they'll be placing ads in the Gazette and local papers to notify the community that transportation will be provided through Lynx. It's my understanding that Trade Winds will pay the fee for individuals and the vans will run on Tuesdays. I informed Mr. Butterfield that the Milo Recreation Department is considering, along with the cooperation of MSAD 41, to rent a school bus on Saturdays which would allow 40 - 50 individuals to shop in Dover-Foxcroft at no cost to them. The recreation department would pay for the bus and driver out of our fund raising account. I would like to stress the point that the money used to rent the buses has nothing to do with tax payers money. The money used has been earned through the snack shack at Harris Field. Mr Butterfield thought it was a great idea and has offered to help the recreation department out by paying for the fuel. The Milo Recreation Department would like to give back to the community that supports us year round. The recreation department will advertise as soon as possible.


### A Bit of Veterans History

Laurence J Keef Of Milo and a member of Joseph P Chaisson American Legion Post 41 shares his military history during the Vietnam War Era.

In June, 1958 at the age of seventeen Larry joined the United States Navy and went to basic training at Great Lakes Ill, upon completion he was assigned to Hospital Corps for sixteen weeks of training and then assigned to the U.S. Navel Hospital, Camp Lejeune, NC in December, 1958.

In June of 1959 he was assigned to 2<sup>nd</sup> Pioneer Battalion, 3rd Marine Division where he then was issued and wore United States Marine Corp uniforms and personal equipment. This assignment was considered as sea



duty though he never actually went to sea. He was a demolition Corpsman and ran a company size sick call. Sometimes Larry would be on the firing range as medical support and other times at the unit sick call which operates like an emergency room.

While on the rocket firing range a marine was fatally wounded when he accidentally stood up during the live fire. Though other medical personnel were available he remembers this event vividly. Another time while in the field on maneuvers a raccoon had gotten up into a tree near a field tent. A Marine from Tennessee claiming to have experience with coons stated that he could get the coon out of the tree. The Marine climbed up the tree and when within three feet away, the coon jumped onto the Marines head and started thrashing his head with claws; the Marine injuries were so bad he had to be air evacuated to the hospital.

Larry was discharged in June 1961 and returned back to Maine where he joined the Active Naval Reserve in Bangor until 1966.

### Week Three of Owen Letters

The letters this week, one to Will's father and one to his sister Abbie, are the last ones written from Portland. . Not all of Will's letters will be published in these weekly entries because of the number of them. If you are interested, you may read them all at the Historical Society when we reopen in the spring. After being sent to Boston on Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> , they sailed aboard the Merrimack to Washington on Sept. 6<sup>th</sup>.

The Merrimack (1859-1887) was built for the cotton trade and operated between Boston and New Orleans. Cotton was brought to Boston for the New England mills. The ship was chartered by the War Department for most of the war. The hull was iron. It was 260 ft. long and 39 feet wide and it weighed 2,199 tons. The government paid \$1350 a day for the charter during the war. She ran aground on the rocks off Little Hope Island, Nova Scotia in 1887.

Camp Mason, Portland  
August 22, 1862

Dear Father:

I write you a few lines first to let you know when to come here. We have been uniformed today and shall probably leave here by next week sometime. And I want you to be here by the middle of next week if you can. Tell Bowen to be sure and come with you if he can. I am well. Be sure and come and fetch me some stockings. Till you come, good bye.

From your son  
William

Camp Mason, Portland  
August 29, 1862

Dear Sister:

I thought I would write a few lines this morning as I have not much to do. Father and Bowen got here last Wednesday eve and I can tell you that I was glad to see them. We have got all our things except our guns and then we don't know when we shall get them, but till we leave here. We expect to leave here next Sunday or Monday.

Father has stopped with us on the field sine he came. I will send you a sample of our hard bread by him when he goes home.

I was writing all day yesterday for the Captain. I signed my name to six different papers yesterday.

How is Mother now? Tell her not to worry about me for I am well, but to take care of her own health and not to make too many rag carpets. Tell Etta that I will write to her as soon as i get time. We expect to get paid today but I don't know. Father will stay I guess until we leave if we go by Sunday or Monday. Give my love to Mother and all the rest of the folks and take good care of Tige for my sake. I can't stop to write any more this time. I am 4th Corporal.

Write as soon as you get this and direct to Co B  
20th Reg't Portland, Me. Don't put on the Box 2171.

## Week four of the Owen Letters

The Steamship Merrimac reached Washington on Sept. 6<sup>th</sup> 1862 after 3 days at sea. It carried troops of the 20<sup>th</sup> Maine and the 26<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts. The 20<sup>th</sup> Maine spent the night camped out on the wharf.

Washington September 7, 1862

Dear Parents and Sister:

I take the first opportunity that I can get to inform you when we got here and how I be. Well here we are in Washington within sight of the Capitol. We started from Portland on Tuesday the 2nd day of this month in the cars to Boston. We got to Boston about 2 o'clock then we went on board the steamship MERRIMAC and stayed all night and the next morn we sailed for Washington. We had a very pleasant trip coming. Did not have a bit of rough sea. We were out of sight of land for only one day. One day we did not see land at all. I was not sea sick at all. A good many of the boys were very sick. We got here last night and came onto the wharf and camped down and went to sleep. I slept all night and as soon as I do at home. In the morning I got up and went out on this field.

We shall not stop long here I don't think. I can't write but a little tonight because it is so late. I am perfectly well and enjoying myself.

How did father get home? You can direct the same as before. I don't know as you had better write until I write again. The boys are all well. I will write again as soon as I can.

Will

Don't worry about me.
