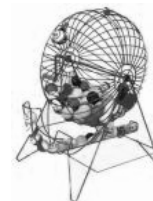

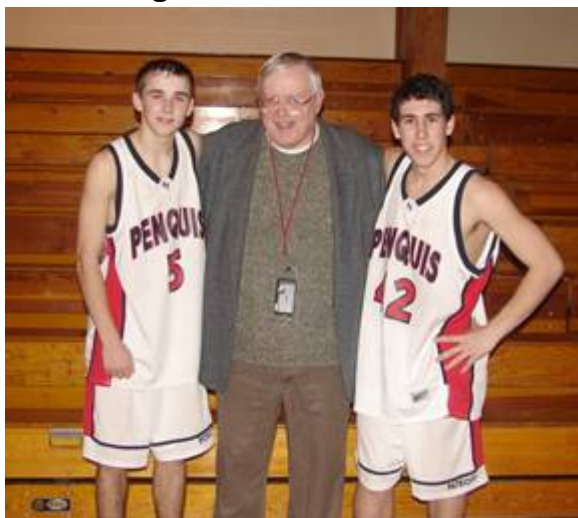

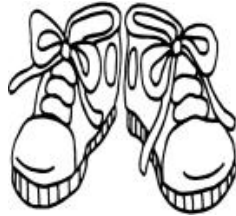

Chicken Fajita Pizza

1 medium green pepper
1 medium red pepper
1 onion
2 boneless chicken breasts
2 pizza crust mixes (I think the brand is Robin Hood and you mix them with warm water, let them rise for 5 minutes then spread them on a greased pizza pan or pizza stone).
salsa (I use mild, but the heat is your choice) 8 oz. shredded Mexican cheese (you can shred your own using a combination of cheddar and jalapeño stick cheese and a grater) and sour cream

Now for the mystery; what to do with the ingredients? I'm quite sure that I remember cooking the chicken. I think I grilled it and then cut it into bite sized pieces. I would julienne the peppers and slice the onion. Prepare the crust according to package directions. Top the crust with some of the salsa, the chicken pieces and vegetables, then the cheese. Bake probably 15-18 minutes in a 425-degree oven. Serve with remaining salsa and sour cream on the side.

P.E.T.S. REMINDER TO SPAY, NEUTER FAMILY PETS

P.E.T.S., a local, non-profit, all volunteer, spay/neuter organization wants to remind area residents to have their pets spayed or neutered. Spaying and neutering greatly reduces reproductive diseases in both cats and dogs, can reduce or eliminate spraying and injuries due to fighting in male cats, and reduce or eliminate the dog or cat's desire to roam. Having your pet spayed or neutered will help to reduce the tragic overpopulation, abandonment and euthanasia of cats and dogs in our area. P.E.T.S. has a reduced cost spay/neuter program for those individuals that qualify.
