FROM MILO ELEMENTARY

M.S.A.D. #41 Elementary Schools sponsor Healthy Me - Inside and Out, a two day Health and Nutrition Workshop for all local school children grades K-6 in that district April 12th & 13th, 2006 at Milo Elementary School.

As we head into the busy summer months in Maine, M.S.A.D. #41 Elementary staff will prepare their students by offering a two day extravaganza that will focus on multiple aspects of health and safety for area children. In a monumental undertaking, several staff members at M.S.A.D. #41 developed a Healthy Me - Inside and Out program for the 400 elementary school children in that district. Students from all of the elementary schools in the

district converged on Milo Elementary School on April 12th and 13th for two full day sessions.



Mrs. Sue Chaffee, M.S.A.D. # 41 School Nurse, was on hand to promote the increasingly popular 5-2-1-0 concept of maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Mrs. Dawn Russell, elementary Physical Education and Health instructor, and Cindy Herbest, a local yoga instructor, engaged the students in fun physical activities throughout the two day workshop. "Our parade through town ...led by an array of human sized fruits and vegetables drew lots of attention," added Andrea Mills, Chairperson of the event.

This program was made possible through grants received from Healthy ME Partnership and the ME Nutrition Network.

Highlights of the two day program included such notables as Slim Goodbody, Zach Field; noted juggler, Buckle Bear, the smoke house from the Penobscot County Fire Chief's Association, and a Masonic Fingerprinting Clinic.

Representatives from the Piscataquis County Sheriff's office, The Maine State Police, ME Poison Outreach, Milo Ambulance Service, Milo Police Dept., Mid Coast EMS, Maine Warden Service, and Maine Forest Service, spoke on such issues as water safety, gun safety, sun safety, bike safety, seat belt safety, wildfire and camping safety, stranger dangers and poisons. Representatives from Mainely Nutrition Network, Mayo Counseling Program, Wellspring Outpatient Services, Cooperative Extension, and Mentor Anti-smoking Education, were available to speak on the subjects of nutrition, dental health, harmful use of drugs, alcohol and tobacco.

FROM THE COOK SCHOOL IN LAGRANGE





Milo Free Public Library News

There are a number of items I could write about this week, but I guess I will start with the garden books collection. The Milo Free Public Library is very lucky to have an extensive garden collection. We have many, many books on different aspects of gardening. Of course, we have lots of books on how to grow flowers and vegetables, but there are also books on trees, shrubs, and landscaping; books on garden pests, pruning and composting and many other subjects. We have several books on how to attract birds to your garden, what to plant to draw them and what kind of bird houses to build to keep them. There are books on such diverse subjects as window boxes or stone work, and books on such specific plants as cacti, ferns, mushrooms and roses. How did the library get this large collection? I knew the Milo Garden Club had been involved in much of the early history of our garden section so I made some telephone calls. I first called a garden club member who was also a library trustee, Joanne DeWitt. Joanne told me Mary Lutterell had been the president of the club in 1980 so we felt that was a good place to start. When I



contacted Mary, she could give me some information but she decided to check with Dorothy Trask also. When Mary got back to me, she had this information from Dot. In the 60's the library did not have much of a garden collection, so the garden club decided to purchase garden books for the library to be used by garden club members and library patrons alike. The club members either purchased the books directly or gave money for the library to purchase books. No one is quite sure on this part. For many years the Milo Garden Club also presented memorial books in memory of deceased club members which practice also added to the garden collection at the library. A few shelves were set aside for this particular group of books and that is how our collection began. To mark these books as special someone made a little wooden log sign, stating "Garden Center". Unfortunately in my search for information no one could tell me who had made this little sign, which we still use to designate our special garden collection. Perhaps someone reading this would have an idea. The library has purchased books to add to this collection, and patrons also give memory gifts with requests that we purchase books for our garden section. Just recently in renovating the downstairs reference room, we set aside six (see how the garden collection has grown) shelves in order that we could bring the garden collection downstairs to be part of our non-fiction area. The new home for our garden books is well-lit with many windows and with well spaced shelves, so all the books stand upright, and their titles are easily seen. The Milo Free Public Library is proud of its large garden collection and gives thanks to the Milo Garden Club and all others who have made donations.

As I was doing this research to find out the connection between the Milo Garden Club and the library, Mary gave me some additional facts about the club. The Milo Garden Club was organized in 1930 and federated in 1934. The garden club does not purchase books for the library now as it did in the 60's and 70's but members plant flowers in the summer and provide a wreath for the front door of the library at Christmas time. The crabapple tree on the library lawn, which is so spectacular every spring, was a gift from the club many years ago. The garden club decorates the town with colorful flowers in summer and plants trees. The Milo Garden Club also maintains a lovely memorial garden in the cemetery every summer.

The Kiwanis Kids Korner met on April 12, with Val again present, Frank and Dottie Brown and also a parent, Eric McLeod. Also helping were many young people. Key Club members were Josh Clement, Katie Patten, and Kristin Robinson. Theresa Karpowicz and Macy Carey were also on hand to help out with the 26 Kiwanis Kids present. I may have missed a Key Club member. If so, I am sorry. The story Val read while the "Kids" nibbled on baked chips, apple juice and milk was Beatrice Didn't Want To by Laura Numeroff. Beatrice didn't want to until she got to the library during a story hour and then Beatrice didn't want to leave. The craft the youngsters worked on this week was a cute Welcome Spring door hanger. It consisted of a white picket fence decorated with colorful wooden petal daisy-like flowers and a welcome sign over all. Everyone had fun making these little crafts.

I have heard about these several times, but never tried it. I got the e-mail again yesterday and really didn't feel like cooking last night and decided to try it, not only were we amazed they turned out, we had a blast making them! We chopped green onions, cilantro, grated cheese, ham, sausage and roasted red bell peppers. We each got our own Ziploc freezer bags with out names on them put in two eggs and filled them up with whatever we each wanted then threw them into the pot of boiling water and in 13 minutes they were done! I even heard the girls telling their friends how we had this really "cool dinner tonight!" Give it a try, you won't be disappointed especially if you are having to feed a lot of people with different tastes or even just a couple because it's quick fun and easy!

ZIPLOC OMELETS

Have guests write their name on a QUART-size Ziploc FREEZER bag with permanent marker. Crack 2 eggs (large or extra-large) into the bag (not more than 2) shake to combine them. (I kind of scrunched them around by squeezing the bag.)

Put out a variety of ingredients such as: cheeses, ham, onion, green pepper, tomato, hash browns, salsa, etc. Each guest adds prepared ingredients of choice to their bag and shake, Make sure to get the air out of the bag and zip it up.

Place the bags into rolling, boiling water for exactly 13 minutes. You can usually cook 6-8 omelets in a large pot. For more, make another pot of boiling water. Open the bags and the omelet will roll out easily. Be prepared for everyone to be amazed.

Carroll and I tried these for breakfast this morning and they worked like a charm!! They were totally delicious. Be sure to only boil them for 13 minutes. They weren't a bit tough....they were wonderful. Amazing how they rolled out of their bags right on to our plates. I cut up ham, onions, green peppers, mushrooms, a tomato, and shredded cheddar cheese. You don't need a lot of any of those for just two omelets.
