DO YOU KNOW -

- ❖ THAT in the spring of 1919, amidst complete devastation, the poppies bloomed in abundance on the battlefields of France, where so many of our men had fallen in battle, and that a replica of this poppy has become the Memorial Flower of The American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary?
- ❖ THAT the American Legion was the first national organization to adopt the poppy as its Memorial Flower, having taken this action at the National Convention in Cleveland, September 27-29, 1920?
- ❖ THAT the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy as its Memorial Flower at its organizing convention held in Kansas City, in October, 1921?
- ❖ THAT at the time the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy it pledged the profits from the poppy sales 100 per cent to welfare relief for service men and women and their families, thus fulfilling the true meaning of the poppy - an emblem of faith, faith which is being kept with all who died, through service to the living?
- ❖ THAT the memorial poppies are made of red crepe paper, by hand, by disabled veterans in hospitals and poppy workrooms in forty states, and that the workers receive pay for each poppy made, the materials being furnished free by the Department in the state in which the hospital is located?
- ❖ THAT through the American Legion Auxiliary poppy program more than \$300,000 is paid annually to needy and disabled service men and women for making the poppies?
- ❖ THAT the more than 25,000,000 poppies made annually under the guidance of the American Legion Auxiliary amount to more than \$2,000,000, every penny of which is devoted to rehabilitation work by both the Legion and Auxiliary, which includes aid to the needy veterans and their families?

We look forward to the continuing support from the community for our poppy program and would like to express our gratitude to all of our service people both past and present.

Yes...her hair was a lot of care, but she did it all herself wrote Kendra's proud mom, Teresa Hall, recently.

Kendra had never cut more than an inch of her hair off at any one time. For over a year she has been considering sending a donation of her hair to the increasingly well known "Locks of Love" organization. Kendra was aware that her hair could be used to help financially disadvantaged youngsters suffering a long term medical hair loss by its use in the creation of a custom prosthetic (wig or other hairpiece). These prostheses are intended to help restore the recipient child's self esteem and confidence and enable them to go forth into their worlds better equipped to join in the activities with their peers that are so important to healthy growth and development. Kendra's hair for her donation had to be at least ten inches in length which means caring for a lot of hair for quite a length of time - truly a labor of love for the ten year old.

Saturday, April 29, was the day Kendra chose to have the cut for her donation done. Her contribution shortened her hair by ten and a half inches at Korner Kreations which is located at 14 Charles Street in Milo. Kendra's smile hints that this was an event that added to her own confidence and positive self-regard. Her ten years has not been a long time to learn the joy of giving, but she has already learned very well.

Kendra's kind gift was mailed off in a plastic bag in a padded envelope to Lake Worth, Florida, by her mom with before and after pictures. Hopefully, in the near future you will be able to see Kendra's pictures in the photo gallery of donors on the website www.locksoflove.org

Kendra, and all our other Locks of Love donors, deserves our recognition for their generous and selfless gift, for a personal sacrifice to benefit another child, and for an exemplary act of

Sharing Murrel's Legacy with the World: A Tribute By Tommy Gillis and Marie Houde

There are many ways to remember a person. This is our attempt to allow Murrel's legacy to continue and to share his life with the world. Marie and I have created a living memorial of sorts. It requires some background on the hobby of GPS navigation and orienteering, so please be patient as we give a little information.



Geocaching is a hobby that has been gaining popularity since it first began back in 2000 by a GPS (Global Positioning System) enthusiast. All it takes is a GPS, internet access and a desire to go "treasure-hunting." A GPS is just a glorified digital compass that gets its bearings from the many satellites orbiting the earth. By logging onto www.geocaching.com and creating a free account, you have access to the longitude and latitude coordinates of "treasure boxes" in your area or in other areas of the country/world. Each treasure box is called a cache and contains various trinkets. There is a "take something, leave something" policy to the box, so that there is always something in the box for fellow finders.

Most things you find are yours to keep. But in some caches you may come upon what is known as a "travel bug." They are a registered item that is out on a very specific mission and they are meant to be moved from cache box to cache box. It is the responsibility of the person that takes the "travel bug" to help it

along its way. These "travel bugs" come in all forms, from figurines to beanie baby type stuffed animals. Each Travel Bug tag has an ID number, and that ID number needs to be logged onto www.geocaching.com once discovered so that their journeys can be tracked by geocachers.

Marie and I began geocaching to get out of the house and get a little exercise. We have "treasured hunted" in the New England area finding treasures in hikes through the woods, on trails, in cities, towns, public parks, state parks, national parks...just about anywhere. In our first cache, we stumbled across one of these "travel bugs", filled its mission and sent it out again. It was so fun to see what geocacher picked it up next and where they left it. So we ordered Travel Bug tags (they resemble dog tags) of our own to have for when we would want to use them. As it turned out, we would be using our first travel bug to honor a very special person.

We were heading up the Maine turnpike to attend the unexpected funeral of a friend of Milo. Traveling in the car we talked about what Milo had lost with Murrel passing away. We talked about the kind of man that Murrel was and what he loved. That is when we decided that there was some unfinished business that needed attending, and the "Murrel the Squirrel" Travel Bug was born. So Murrel now has a little friend that is setting out to see the world of baseball. "Murrel the Squirrel" would like to visit baseball venues around the United States from Little League all the way to the Major League Ballparks. And maybe "Murrel" will get a chance to see Yankee Stadium or take in the Little League World Series. We ask the people who pick up "Murrel" from the caches to share a little something baseball with him and then place him in another cache for new adventures. Chocolate-Caramel Cake

1 pkg. German Chocolate Cake mix
1 14-oz can sweetened condensed milk
1 12 to 12 1/4 jar caramel ice cream topping
1 8-oz. container Cool Whip - thawed
3 1.4 oz bars chocolate covered English toffee chopped

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and lightly flour a 13X9 inch baking pan. Prepare the cake mix according to package directions. Pour the cake batter in the prepared pan. Bake according to package directions. Cool on a wire rack.

Using the handle of a wooden spoon, poke holes about 1 inch apart over the top of the cake. Pour the sweetened condensed milk, then the caramel tapping over the cake. This gooey concoction will soak into the cake making each mouthful yummy! Spread evenly with the Cool Whip and sprinkle with the chopped toffee bars before serving. This will need to be stored in the refrigerator.
