100th Anniversary Celebration of the Milo Fire Department

The planning committee has been meeting for months. The banners have been up for weeks. It's time for everyone to save the dates - July 21, 22, and 23 to honor our fire department volunteers - past and present - for their selfless service to the community. Milo is ready to celebrate!!!

The Kick Off event will be on Friday, July 21 at 6:00 p.m. A Decorated Doll Carriage/Bicycle/Tricycle Parade will be held at the Maine Savings Federal Credit Union parking lot. This event is being coordinated by Phil Gerow who brings his years of experience and his fun-loving self to the children's parade.

Saturday at 10:00 a.m. the 100th Anniversary Parade will begin at the parking lot of Johndro and Sons, Inc (JSI) on Park Street and end at Penquis Valley School parking lot. Parade Chairman, Robert Ellison, has confirmed over fifty units to date and more are expected to be confirmed within the remaining days. A fly-over by a Maine National Guard jet flown by local pilot, Ed Vanedestine, will add to the fun and excitement.

And what's a parade without horses? Infinity Farm will be participating in the parade and presenting an Equestrian Quadrille Team demonstration in the yard beside the American Legion Post Home following the parade.

Throughout the day merchants and vendors will display their wares on the sidewalks.

1 Tbs. vinegar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup cold water.

Put all of the dry ingredients into an ungreased 8 inch square pan. Make three holes in the dry mixture. Pour the oil into one hole, vinegar into one hole and vanilla into the last hold. Pour cold water over all and stir with a fork until evenly blended. Bake for 35-40 minutes in a 350F oven. Frost in the pan.
