
It's a Girl!

What a busy day we had on Wednesday! We had over 100 people come into the library through one program or another. In the morning we had two sessions of Debbie Knapp's Preschool. What fun to meet the children and their parents and grandparents. Several of the children are quite familiar to us as regular library patrons, but we wanted to make the library friendly for the other children so they will want to return too. I read two stories to the youngsters. The children love Mr. Wiggle's Book which is about a bookworm who tells in rhyme how carelessness towards books makes him very sad. The second book was Pumpkins telling how they are grown to become Jack-O-Lanterns. This book has very large, bright pictures. Great for a group reading. Using a veteran library goer, we also showed the new children how easy it is to take out a book. Finally we gave them all orange Halloween bags and let them go downstairs to choose two free picture books from our table of donated and discarded juvenile books. They happily left with their "loot" to go on to the fire station and police headquarters as part of their Community Helpers field trip day.

Wednesday afternoon we were settling down to work when Val Robertson arrived to tell us that the Kiwanis Kids Korner was having its first session of the fall that afternoon. Wow! No problem except we had a few tables downstairs to clean up of books, maps and magazines. Val helped and in just a short while we were ready for more "Kids". Val brought everything from the

story book to craft materials. The library supplies the tables and the space. When the time came, there were 28 "Kids", two adults-Frank Cochrane and Val-and three young Key Club helpers. Val has been conducting the Kiwanis Kids Korner since the spring of 2003, and this is her 8th session. Wednesday I was really surprised to see that some of our former preschool patrons have now reached Kindergarten and are attending the Kiwanis Kids Korner! Time marches on! Val read a Halloween story while the children had their snack, and then she had the "Kids" decorate their very own little pumpkins. Mike Comeau donated enough for every child. Thank you, Mike. They did a great job decorating, and the ones we saw upstairs looked very professional with color and glitter.

CLARENCE M. ELLIS BRADFORD - Clarence M. Ellis, 78, died Oct. 11, 2006, at his residence. He was born Dec. 14, 1927, in Brownville, the son of Kenneth and Clellie (Arbo) Ellis. He served in the Army Signal Corps as a radio operator, worked for the B & A Railroad as a telegraph operator and ran a repair business in Bangor and Brewer for more than 40 years. He was a Boy Scout operator for more than 50 years and directed an international Camporee in Japan. He held the Silver Award and the Japanese Hands Across the Sea Award and retired as a scout field commissioner. He was a member of the American Legion Post No. 29, Glendale, Ariz. Surviving, in addition to his wife, Bertha (Wilkinson) Ellis of Bradford, are two sons, Mark and wife, Tina, of Orrington and Aakon and wife, Mary, of Bradford; a granddaughter, Brigget Ellis; a sister, Annette Ellis; a brother, Donald, both of Brownville; and three children by a former marriage, Clayton Ellis of Corinth, Penny Amore of Bangor and Cisca Ellis of North Carolina. Graveside memorial services will be held 10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 21, at Brownville Village Cemetery. Cremation arrangements are by Thompson Funeral Home, 17 Hudson Road, Corinth.

GORDON WHITNEY SMITH GEYSERVILLE, Calif. - Gordon W. Smith, of Alexander Valley, passed away July 22, 2006, in Santa Rosa, Calif. He was born Dec. 21, 1930, in Brownville Junction, to Whitney George and Alice Daly Smith. He attended Brownville Junction schools and spent his first year of study at the University of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, where he was a member of the English Debating Society. He spent his second year of

study at the University of Maine - Orono and was inducted into the

Sigma Nu Fraternity. He joined the U.S. Army and became a member of the 187th Airborne Division and fought in the Korean War, where he won a Bronze Star for valor during the Kumhua Valley campaign. After his army service, he re-entered the University of Maine - Orono and received a Bachelor of Art in history and government in 1957. He entered the teaching profession and taught at a number of schools. He spent his last 17 years of teaching in Madison, teaching English, Latin, civics and history. He coached drama at the high school and won a number of local and state awards. Gordon was a lifelong history buff, particularly ancient history. Gordon also became a collector of firearms and cars and restored two Porsches; a 1974, 914 and a 1962 series 356. He was a motorcycle enthusiast and rode his motorcycle around the Alexander Valley area.
