PVHS KEY CLUB INSTALLATION



P.E.T.S receives a grant

The P.E.T.S. (prevent euthanasia through sterilization) organization was awarded \$600. from The PETCO Foundation's annual Round Up/Spay Today fundraiser, which ended August 13, 2006. The PETCO fundraiser exceeded \$808,000 in donations nationwide.

The four-week fundraiser concentrated on raising funds for spay/neuter focused organizations like P.E.T.S. Customers visiting one of the PETCO's more than 800 stores could round up their purchase with the donated difference going to support spay and neuter efforts to help solve the problem of pet overpopulation.

Each PETCO store selected one or more spay/neuter-focused partners to be the recipient(s) of its fundraising efforts. This year, P.E.T.S. partnered with the PETCO store on Stillwater Ave. in Bangor.

"We are continually inspired and impressed by the passion and generosity of our customers, vendors and associates," said Paul Jolly, Foundation Director and Vice President. "We're deeply grateful to be able to organize and distribute this collection effort each year on behalf of all of those animals who depend on us for their well-being."

The award received from PETCO will help P.E.T.S. to continue their mission of reducing overpopulation and abandonment by spaying and neutering companion animals. "We are very grateful to the PETCO Foundation and the community for their support," said Sue Slate, President of P.E.T.S. There continues to be a huge overpopulation and abandonment issue around cats in Maine. Cats are able to reproduce around five months of age. Shelters continue to be overflowing with the homeless. There are too many animals and not enough homes. The logical solution is to spay and neuter, which necessitates individual awareness and community support.

Special thanks were given to Bob Ellison for helping with the distribution, to Jeff Gahagan for managing the funds, and to Ed & Ethelyn Treworgy for the party and their support.

Happy Dollars were given for the speaker of the day from the YMCA and the many benefits to his family from the Y; celebrating Bob's birthday; Bob lamented that if he had known he was going to live this long, he would have taken better care of himself; and a golfing score card was given by Eben to Herb to remind him of a memorable day of golf; happy for Val's marvelous ending to the story in *Three Rivers News*. Sad dollars were given for the passing of Gerald Smith.

Penquis Valley Key Club's installation is scheduled for Wed. night, Jan. 3, at 6:00 p.m. at the high school cafeteria. Kiwanians were urged to attend and will assist with the installation and dessert following.

Speaker Chairman for January is Jim Macomber. He announced that on Jan. 10 Thelma Regan will be speaking about the Adult Education program and Elaine McAvoy will speak on Jan. 24. The Jan. 17 meeting will be a business meeting to inform the members of action at the board meeting which will be held on Jan. 11. The Jan. 31 meeting (fifth Wednesday) will be an evening meeting at Lois Trask's home and it will be a Yankee Swap. Further information will be forthcoming about this meeting.

Joe Zamboni advised that the Christmas tree needs to be taken down at the Gazebo.

A reminder that Terrific Kids Assemblies are held at all three elementary schools each week and Kiwanians are urged to attend.

Jim Macomber introduced the speaker of the day, Becky Walker, director at the Piscataquis Regional YMCA. The Y was built in 1988 and will be celebrating 20 years next year. Becky started working at the Y 13 years ago as a part time fitness director and now works full time as Program Director. There are just two full time employees; the rest are part-timers, as well as many, many volunteers.

Becky explained to us that the YMCA offers the opportunity for all ages, young to elderly and handicapped, to be involved in all sorts of programs from working out to swimming to crafts and other activities. The Y is also used by area organizations as a meeting place and the town uses it as their voting place. They are now collaborating through the National YMCA with Disney so they can offer children's movies, some of which are interactive films, which get the kids up, and moving. They also have many little ones who swim with their moms. Cindy Herbest of Milo is the fitness instructor. A new program, The Ilditaro Fitness Challenge, is starting Jan. 2. This 5,672.4-mile trip can be accomplished by exercising 4 hours a week. You choose from the many classes offered to complete this challenge. A Spa Relaxation package goes to the winner. Contact the Y for more info.

A grant from PPHC enabled the Y to start a GYM (Get Youth Moving) program for 200 preschoolers in the area. JSI of Milo donated an extra \$1000 so that another day care in Milo could be included in the program.

There are 170 kids involved in the basketball program and they hope to expand into areas outside of Dover. Transportation funding is difficult as the capital campaign fell short in its goal this year so they will have to continue with their efforts in order to be able to have Y programs go to other towns or to transport kids from outlying areas to the YMCA. Rita Mountain is offering a sewing class and a painting class this spring for children and Dr. David McDermott works with kids on a diet and exercise program.

In the past, a "Fit to Respond" fitness program was held for the Dover Foxcroft Fire Dept. Eighteen out of thirty firemen took the class. This program could be made available to other departments also. Becky said the Y is open to suggestions for programs.

Many thanks to Becky Walker for her very informative program.
