Content: I am the youngest son of William H. Stinneford, who was born in the Junction on July 19, 1907. One of my brothers and one of my sisters and I are coming to Schoodic to toast his 100th birthday in July. I'm also bringing my wife and 10-year old son, James Madison Stinneford, named after his great-great grandfather, J. Madison Stineford, Civil War veteran (Company H, 11th Maine Regiment) and buried in the Brownville Cemetery. Someone suggested that this might be of some interest to your readers -- I leave that to your judgment.

I am happy to pen a short piece if you would like. My grandfather, also William H., had a farm just north of the Junction and also used to run the mail sled over the hill to Milo during the winter months (long before my time). We used to vacation at Schoodic every summer. My dad had six brothers and a sister Florence, who married Richard Mersereau, after whom I am named. They retired to Brownville many years ago and had a home on the back Brownville road and a camp on the Lake in Lakeview. They are buried in the Brownville Junction cemetery as are my grandmother, Annie Johnson, grandfather and one of my dad's brothers who died as a young child.

## Milo Free Public Library News

I've read two books recently that impressed me so much, I felt I wanted to write about them in this column. Interestingly enough they both take place during wars-WW II and Iraq.

I've always been interested in the Japanese Internment during World War II, but not enough to do serious research about it. However, the fictional book Tallgrass by Sandra Dallas is about that very subject, and I found the story and characters well developed and realistic. This story is told from the viewpoint of Rennie Stroud who lived in the town near the internment camp-Tallgrass. She is quite frightened of the camp and its inhabitants until she gets to meet some of the young Japanese men and women (who ironically were born in the United States and speak little or no Japanese). Several of the young men work on her father's sugar beet farm planting and harvesting sugar beets. This book is part thriller, part historical novel and an exploration of the human heart at its darkest and at its best.

The other book is the recent non-fiction In an Instant by Lee and Bob Woodruff which begins with the war in Iraq and Bob's head injuries. In this book these two people proceed to share their romance, early marriage, their family and their survival following the tragedy that transformed their lives in January 2006. Bob, a very recent news anchor on ABC was hit by an IED (Improvised Explosive Device) and suffered a TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury) that nearly killed him. Luck, superb medical attention and love sustained this couple through this intense drama. Along with this inspiring story the book was also interesting to me as it mentioned media personnel in the news rooms, and showed them in behind the scenes positions as friends of this couple. A patron asked us to get this book, and I'm so glad she brought it to my attention.

MILO - Carl M. Hamlin, 88, husband of Althea F. (Conary) Hamlin, died June 3, 2007, at the Maine Veterans' Home, Bangor. He was born July 21, 1918, in Milo, the son of Oscar L. and Pearl M. (Morrill) Hamlin. He graduated from Milo High School and Higgins Classical Institute. In 1940, he married Althea Conary and they enjoyed 67 years of blessed marriage. He served with the U.S. Navy during World War II, where he spent two years as a radar man 2/C aboard the USS LSM 340. He worked for 15 years for Dowlin Lumber Co. In 1955, he was employed by New York Life Insurance Co., as a salesman, retiring in 1975. He was a Boy Scout, a 50-year member of the Piscataquis Masonic Lodge No. 44 and a 61-year member of the J.P. Chaisson American Legion Post No. 41, serving one year as commander. He served on the draft board and as a director of Mayo Memorial Hospital. Carl enjoyed hunting, fishing, and camping at the family cottage on Schoodic Lake. He loved people and enjoyed telling them stories and reciting the poem "The Silver Canoe." Many family members and friends will remember him for his back rubs. He is survived by his wife, Althea of Milo; a son, Stephen and wife, Cheryl Hamlin, of Milo; three daughters, Cynthia Moore and husband,

Richard, of Avon Park, Fla., Carla Jean Harmon and husband, Ernest, of Portland and Julia Andrews and husband, Philip, of Milo; a brother, Robert Hamlin of Brownville; 10 grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren, all of whom he dearly loved. He was predeceased by a brother, George Hamlin.. After cremation, burial will be in the family lot at Evergreen Cemetery. ## Penquis Cruizers' 18th Annual Cruize-In

Plans are well underway for the Penquis Cruizers' 18th Annual Cruize-In to be held at the JSI Store Fixtures parking lot on Route 11 in Milo on Sunday, June 24th. The event begins at 10am and will end around 2pm. The format for the Cruize-In will be similar to past years, said Cruiser president Fred Worcester. "This is not a car show as there are no classes and few trophies presented. It's a time for people to show off their special vehicles in a non-competitive event and to talk with other people who share their love of the sport of automobiling."

There will be a Bumper Ball contest and a Rap contest held mid way through the day. As always, there will be an auction of car related items and donated items and certificates from local businesses starting at 1pm. Norris Oakes of Charleston will be the auctioneer. Worcester says that the timing for the contests and the auction are dependent on the weather. A very hot day or threatening rain may cause them to start earlier. Spectators planning on attending should consider that as they plan a time to view the cars and trucks on display. The best time to see the vehicles would be between 11am and 1pm.

The group will raffle off an L.E.D. poster titled "Porky's Chevy Showdown". Tickets will be available at the Cruize-In, from Penquis Cruiser members and at S&L Auto Parts in Milo prior to the day of the show. There will also be a 50-50 raffle held at the Cruize-In.



Music for the day will be provided by Tune Time DJ Service of Newport and the Three Rivers Kiwanis will sell refreshments during the day.

In past years there have been cars from as far away as Presque Isle, Scarborough, and Beddington attend. 100 cars or more usually make their way to Milo for the show. Admission for the Cruize-In will be \$3 per person. Children under 13 will be admitted free if they are accompanied by an adult. Admission for unaccompanied children will be \$2.

There will be some awards presented during the day. Prizes will be given to the first, second, and third place winners of the Bumper Ball and Rap contests. There will be awards given for a Hard Luck Story connected with attendance at the show, Longest Distance traveled on the day of the show, the club with the most members attending, and a trophy for People's Choice. This award is chosen by those people who enter vehicles in the event. As always, dash plaques will be given to all those registering.

They also plan to volunteer at the Piscataquis County Soil and Water Conservation Camp by cleaning trails and also will help with the Kiwanis Auction.

Ethelyn introduced our speaker for the day, Joanna Tarrazi, director of the Piscataquis Soil and Water Conservation Camp. Joanna has served in this position a little over a year. The two-week day camp has an annual budget of approximately \$2900, of which approx. \$2000 is funded by grants. It is staffed by Joanna and an assistant and they are joined by some parents who stay and help also. The annual summer camp for 7-12 year olds has a full enrollment almost every day. Full capacity is 30 students, but can accommodate a few more. They started this year with a Conservation Poster Contest that is part of a state and national competition. Two Guilford girls tied for 1st place. This activity is valuable as it gets kids thinking and talking about the outdoors and conservation.

They take a fall field trip to the demonstration forest in Williamsburg. With the help of a grant, interpretive and directional signage has been added. She added that this is a "hidden gem" with great educational assets tailored to the needs of kids.

In addition, they have done agricultural tours, trips to dairy farms, and also have creative games and crafts.

The schools circulate information about the camp, which is held at Foxcroft Academy. This year's camp will be held the last week of June and 2<sup>nd</sup> week of July. Cost is \$ 25.00 and runs a half-day from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

### FREE COURSE OFFERED TO FIRST TIME COLLEGE STUDENTS

DOVER-FOXCROFT - Qualified students enrolling in their first college course through the University of Maine System may be eligible to receive an Osher Scholarship for the Fall 2007 semester which begins on September 4.

"Osher Scholarships are made available to encourage more Maine people of all ages to participate in higher education," said Merlene Sanborn, director of the Penquis Higher Education Center in Dover-Foxcroft. "Preference is given to first-time students, and scholarships are available on a first-come, first-served basis."

An Osher Scholarship will cover the cost of a university course, including books and required materials, of up to \$750. To qualify, a student must be a Maine resident, a high school graduate or GED recipient, and someone who is committed to completing a 100, 200 or developmental level university course. The Osher Scholarship is valid in Dover-Foxcroft, as well as at the Penquis college center's other sites in Dexter, Greenville, Guilford, Jackman, and Newport.
