Penquis CAP Accepting Head Start/Child Care Applications

Penquis CAP is currently accepting applications for its child care programs. Head Start and Child Care services are available for children ages 6 weeks to 5 years. Before and After School Care is available for children ages 5-8 years.

Children are provided developmentally appropriate classroom activities to increase skills in Learning, Thinking and Doing, Social Interactions, Large & Small Muscle Development, and Daily Health and Nutrition Routines. With permission from parents, Penquis CAP Head Start and Child Care centers offer health screenings for vision, hearing, speech/language and growth measurements. Meals and snacks are provided to the children at no extra cost to families.

Penquis CAP Child Development is designated a "Quality Program" by the Federal Head Start Program and the National Association for the Education of Young Children. The "Quality Program" designation allows families of enrolled children to receive a double tax credit for their State of Maine Income Tax Child Care Credit.

Full day/full year care is available at centers in Bangor, East Millinocket, Exeter, Dexter, and Old Town. Part day/part year care (September to May) is available in Bangor, Brewer, Dexter, Dover-Foxcroft, East Millinocket, Exeter, Howland, Lee, Lincoln, Milo, Newburgh, Newport, Old Town and Parkman. Before and After School Care is available in Dexter and Exeter.

Child care subsidies are available to eligible families on a sliding scale. For more information, call 973-3567 or 1-800-215-4942 or visit the center nearest you.

GREAT WEATHER AND GREAT PEOPLE MADE FOR A GREAT CRUIZE IN.

Sunday, June 24th, was a beautiful day for an outdoor event and by 8:30 cars and trucks were rolling in to the JSI Store Fixtures parking lot for the Penquis Cruizers' 18th Annual Cruize-In. There are always a lot of vehicles from the local area and people come from some distance to attend



the show. This year vehicles arrived from as far away as

Presque Isle, Bucksport, Greenville, Madison, Lee, and Scarborough to enjoy the day's activities. Nearly 100 vehicles attended the event which is average attendance for the show.

Events included a Bumper Ball Contest where participants back up as close to a pole as possible without knocking off the ball or touching the pole. The three top winners were given trophies. Nathaniel Blocker won the first place prize by stopping 7/8" from the pole. Second place went to Ralph Conway and third place to Jerry Vierra. A Rap Contest was also held. This offers the participants an opportunity to rev up their motors to determine how loud the exhaust noise is. A decibel meter is used for the measurement. The top three winners in this contest were Darren Colbry whose 1997 Chevy pickup measured 111 decibels, Ralph Collins with a 1966 Dodge Charger at 110 decibels, and Justin Gorecki's 1998 Camaro Z28 with a 109 decibel meter reading.

Participants vote for their "Favorite Cruiser" each year and this year Larry Ferguson's 1930 Model A pickup was chosen to win the "Favorite Cruiser" trophy. Ferguson drove to the show from Mattawamkeag. An award is also given for the Best Appearing Club. This year that award was presented to the Dusters Antique Auto Club with ten members registering for the Cruize-In. The prize for a vehicle still in the process of restoration was presented to Walter Ward of Greenville with a 1949 Studebaker pickup that he is restoring.

An L.E.D. poster titled "Porky's Chevy Showdown" was raffled off by the club; the winner of that item was Dan White of Sebec. A 50-50 raffle was held during the day and the winner took home \$185.50. Two Kid's Raffles were held. The winners of this free to kids 10 and under were Riley Roderick, Presque Isle, and Telos Wallace, Milo.

Each year an auction is held which features gift certificates and merchandise donated by local businesses and by Cruiser members as well as new and old car parts and other related items. This is a big part of the Cruize-In and auctioneer Norris Oakes helps boost the proceeds of the show with his skill. The Three Rivers Kiwanis were on hand with their Snack Shack to provide refreshments. Tune Time DJ Service of Newport provided music for the event. The Cruizers' thanked JSI Store Fixtures for use of the parking lot for the event. Without their support there would not be a location in the Milo area for the Cruize-In to be held.

Organizer Susan Worcester said that each year provides a new learning curve for the Cruizers. "We either try something new or refine the way we organize activities throughout the day. This year was no exception. We're always thinking of ways to make the Cruize-In better for those attending without adding work to the load the active members already carry on the day of the event. This year was another success for the club and we are already making notes for #19 in 2008."

Members of the Milo Musketeers 4-H Club were honored by Mr. William Sawtell, Author and Historian from Brownville at a special dessert banquet at the Restaurant in Milo. Mr. Sawtell expressed his gratitude to the 4-H youth for the community service work that they do in Brownville and Milo. He thanked the 4-H youth for all the beautiful handmade cards that he has personally received from them. During the dessert banquet, Mr. Sawtell asked the youth if they knew the three rivers that flowed through Milo. The youth replied, "Piscataquis, Pleasant and Sebec." They were pleased when Mr. Sawtell congratulated them on answering correctly. Mr. Sawtell spoke to the group briefly about the importance of the rivers, railroads and slate quarries. Maine author and wilderness historian Sawtell has lived in Brownville all his life. Since 1982, he's written over 25 non-fiction books, including: Katahdin Iron Works, Boom to Bust (1982), Katahdin Iron Works Revisited (1983), 20th Century Corinna (1984), A History of Lake View Maine (1985), Early Brownville and Her Slate Quarries (1987).

Everyone had a delightful time. After the dessert banquet, members of the Milo Musketeers 4-H Club talked about what a great time they had celebrating with Mr. Sawtell. They never thought that they would be rewarded for doing something that they like to do. Mr. Sawtell is an extremely knowledgeable person about the history of Brownville and Milo. He uses his knowledge to teach the youth about the communities where they live. As the leader of the Milo Musketeers 4-H Club, I observed the interesting way that Mr.

Sawtell talked to the youth on their level. The youth really enjoyed listening to Mr. Sawtell.
