

MSAD 41's Wellness Team Goes to Sugarloaf

June 25-28th once again found eight members of MSAD 41's Wellness Team at the Maine Schoolsite Health Promotion Conference at Sugarloaf. Each year the Dept. of Education sponsors this great conference in order that Wellness Teams might return to their districts better equipped to promote health and wellness for staff and students.

This year's conference, "Step up to Wellness", provided many opportunities for teams to experience wellness in different ways and at different levels. It now becomes the responsibility of individual teams to bring new ideas back to their districts where health promotion and illness prevention is the overall goal.

Some highlights of the conference, along with informative workshops, inspiring roundtable presentations and interesting panel discussions, are the keynote speakers. Each year our team returns home feeling that we have seen and heard "the best," only to find the next year even better!

On Monday, we were both entertained and educated by Chef Jon Ashton, born in Liverpool, England, who learned the joy of cooking through his grandmother's warm, cottage kitchen. Jon began producing and starring in his own local access TV show, "The Mad Chef," and appeared on the "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno." Jon shares his Stealth Health tips that you can use to inspire children to come into the kitchen with you to create their own culinary masterpieces that are nutritious and tasty. It is difficult to explain how much fun it was to learn how to prepare and share fun, healthy, and easy-to-make recipes, such as Pirates of the Caribbean Rice and Shrek Spinach Wraps.

Monday evening's keynote presentation "Maine to Everest" provided an account of John Bagnulo's account of his climb of Mt. Everest last spring. John discussed various aspects of the climb, such as the mountain's surrounding culture, the toll it took on his physical health and the thought processes one uses to climb higher in the faces of adversity.

Personal wellness activities were offered each morning. Members could choose to participate in strength

training, yoga, water aerobics, line dancing, walking and healing meditation.

Tuesday had the offerings of health screenings, exhibits and round table sessions, followed by workshops.

Wednesday brought more wonderful workshop sessions, such as Regis Beaulieu's Move to Learn. His hands-on sessions focused on grades K-3 with the goal of familiarizing teachers with fun techniques of movement in the classroom that will enhance students' learning. Erica Gilbert presented "Gentle and Effective Ways for Dealing with At-Risk and Difficult Children. The Nurtured Heart program taught us why, despite good teaching, good discipline, and good parenting, many difficult children still do not respond.

Thursday morning provided the members with Seth Wescott's road to the Olympics. From Seth's account as a snowboarder in the Farmington area to a seven time X-games medalist, the 2003 SBX Vice-World Champion, the 2005 SBX World Champion, the 3-time US Snowboarding Champion, 2-time Guinness Book world record holder, 10-time X-game finalist, US Grand Prix winner, American Snowboard tour winner and an Olympic Gold Medalist. Seth's message was to live your dream now.

The final conference presenter was Jana Stanfield. Jana combines music and humor with a message that entertains, inspires and encourages. Her message makes people feel better about who they are, what they do and why they're doing it. Known as the Queen of Heavy MENTAL, Jana Stanfield's music has been described as "psychotherapy you can dance to."

Along with workshops, roundtables, keynote speakers, and wellness time, teams also spent time developing an Action Plan that must be submitted to the Dept. of Education before conference end. This plan then becomes the working guide for teams during the upcoming school year.

Many thanks to the "team" for their dedication and hard work, and to the MSAD 41 administrative team who value health and wellness enough to make our attendance at this conference possible. Stay tuned for Wellness in 2007/2008! Linda O'Connor and Cecilia Harmon, Team Leaders.
