##### American Legion Post #41, Announces Scholarship Contest

Penquis Valley High School (PVHS) students have been invited by American Legion Post # 41 in Milo, Maine, to compete in the Annual American Legion National High School Oratorical Scholarship Contest. The invitation to enter the competition was extended today by Post Commander Dick Graves and Post Oratorical Chairman Bob Lee. All PVHS students (US Citizens and Permanent Residents) in grades 9 through 12 are eligible.

PVHS and Post # 41 have had four very successful years in this noteworthy national competition. In 2004 a PVHS student won at the local, county and district level - Placing 4<sup>th</sup> at the Department Of Maine contest. In 2005 a PVHS

sophomore won the statewide American Legion Oratorical Contest in Augusta. The student's oration captivated the audience in the auditorium of the Maine Veterans Home. She placed first and received a check for \$1000, an American Legion Medal, and an expense paid trip to compete in the National Contest at Purdue/Indiana University Conference Center. She won \$1500 at the National Competition. She won \$450 en route to the State Championship. In 2006 our Post # 41 winner also won the District and State contests. In addition to the expense paid trip for the winner and her mother she won an additional \$1500 bringing her one-year total to nearly \$3000. The 2008 contest for students has been arranged with the full cooperation of local school officials: Principal Scott Gordon and History Teacher/Oratorical Coach Jeremy Bousquet of the Penquis Valley High School faculty.

The subject in the Prepared Oration portion of the contest must be about some phase of the Constitution of the United States, emphasizing the duties and Veterans Home. She placed first and received a check for \$1000, an American Legion Medal and an expense paid trip to compete in the National Contest at Purdue/Indiana University Conference Center. She won \$1500 at the National Competition. She won \$450 in route to the State Championship. In 2006 our Post # 41 winner also won the District and State contests. In addition to the expense paid trip for the winner and her mother she won an additional \$1500 bringing her one-year total to nearly \$3000. The 2008 contest for students has been arranged with the full cooperation of local school officials: Principal Scott Gordon and History Teacher/Oratorical Coach Jeremy Bousquet of the Penquis Valley High School faculty.

The subject in the Prepared Oration portion of the contest must be about some phase of the Constitution of the United States, emphasizing the duties and obligations of a citizen to the United States. The Prepared Oration must be the original effort of each contestant and must be 8-10 minutes in length. However, the coaches may provide significant mentoring. The judges at each level are civic, academic and military leaders.

Competition is scheduled to commence at American Legion Post 41 in Milo on January 15, 2008. The winner will be presented a Gold Medal and \$250 cash award, 2<sup>nd</sup> Place -- Silver Medal and \$150 and 3<sup>rd</sup> Place -- Bronze Medal and \$100. The winner will proceed to 14th District (Piscataquis County American Legion Contest. On Saturday, Feb 16, 2008 the winners of each District will compete at the State Level for the American Legion Department of Maine Title and a chance to compete in the National Contest in Indianapolis, IN. The State Championships will be held at Thomas College in Waterville.

Each State winner **who competes** in the first round of the National Scholarship Contest **will receive a \$1,500 scholarship**. Participants in the second round who do not advance to the National Final round will **receive an additional \$1,500 scholarship**. The top three youth orators who have won all previous elimination rounds of the contest will vie for top honors in the National Contest on April 5 & 6, 2008, at the IUPUI Conference Center and Hotel, Indianapolis, IN. In addition to the awards received by winners of the various elimination rounds, **university scholarships of \$18,000, \$16,000, and \$14,000 will be awarded to the first through third places in the National Finals**

The American Legion will pay travel and lodging expenses for the State winner and his or her coach for the trip to the National Contest. The coach may be a teacher, parent or guardian over 21 years of age.

It served as a good analogy as I sank into my thoughts, attempting to avoid the unpleasant splashback both of the blueberry-scented outhouse liquid and the residue of my life. The reason I had to wear my sport jacket to the outhouse had everything to do with an oak tree. I am coming to understand why the Druids held oak trees to be sacred - because they have a will of their own, which they impose on humans to amuse themselves. (Surely the oak limb that I had dropped onto the RV and through the rear window had no more in mind that its own amusement.) Since July I had been eying an oak tree on the edge of the water with a purpose. The tree is the only thing blocking a completely clear view of the cove, the bay, and Mt. Cadillac in Acadia National Park to the south. Being in a coastal zone, it cannot be cut down; but I am allowed to trim limbs that obstruct the view. The limb hung out over the edge of the bank, so when I extended the lopper to its 14 foot length, I could barely reach it only by standing on tiptoe.

I should have recognized the warning signs. I knew it would take a while to saw, because it was about 8 inches in diameter. Why I was doing it at this particular time, I'm not sure. I had about two hours of daylight left and the wind was blowing something fierce off the water into my face. But I thought how gratifying it would be to know that the hated limb was finally gone, as I was sitting in my RV celebrating my triumph over nature.

As I was sawing, the wind, which had picked up a bit, blew sawdust into my face and eyes and under my collar. To add to nature's sadism, it was very cold and wet and had started to rain.

In any event, in 10 minutes I had gotten most of the way through, when the limb bent ever so slightly downwards--not quite enough to break off the rest of the way, like the one over the RV, but just enough to embrace my lopper's blade in a vise-like grip. No pulling, jerking or bad words were sufficient to release its grip. The sun was going down and the rain was coming down, but I was not to be denied. I was tired from the sawing, but felt I could still figure out how to retrieve my lopper. The most natural approach would be to somehow pull down on the end of the branch to cause it to break away from the tree and free up the saw blade. The problem was that the end of the branch was a good 15 feet up and another 10 feet or so away from the edge of the bank. After some Neanderthal-like thought, I fetched the rope I had already used a few times to skid trees with the Lexus. Then I had to figure out how to get the rope over the limb and down again so that I could pull down on it, break the limb and go to bed happy. I looked for something to weight the rope, and found a piece of wood a foot and a half long, with branches I could tie the rope to. I might have been overly optimistic both about the process as well as my strength. The wood probably weighed 7 or 8 pounds, a bit of overkill, but I was determined.

The entire process was an education. First I tried throwing the log directly, kind of a shot-put approach. It didn't work. The next time I tried it without standing on the rope. It worked a little better, but still fell short.

Next I tried flinging it and then swinging it on the rope, fantasies of me as a cowboy flying through my head. The fantasies were not really constructive, as they distracted me from seeing the log as it swung around and whacked me solidly in my shoulder, obviously from malice on the part of the oak. Again I heard Virginia laugh in my head. I actually heard her say "poor honey"! After 10 tries I was getting tired. I had not even come

close to the limb, the wind and the rain were lashing about me, the handle of the lopper was swinging wildly in the wind, and I was throwing without effect.

I needed a change in tactic. So I got a smaller piece of wood, the one I should have started with; but now, because I was so tired, the distance I could achieve was approximately the same. But through a combination of wild, looping swings and exaggerated, clown-like footwork, I managed to get the log over the limb, and only slipped once down onto the rocks as I was retrieving the end and getting ready to pull. At this point the theatre of the situation was tremendous, with the wind, rain, darkness, the full moon coming up over the water, and a crazed man with bloodshot, sawdust-filled eyes pulling frantically on a branch in an epic struggle of esthetics over common sense.

The branch refused to break. I tried pulling the rope as I walked toward the lopper handle, thinking that perhaps I could bounce the thing free, but it was to no avail. I tied the rope around a bush and jumped up and down on it in an attempt to free the blade, but nothing would work. It was dark, wet, and the tree had won the round.

So as any more or less normal person would do, I jumped into my clean car with my muddy boots, and drove to Home Depot to buy another \$79 lopper to free the first one.

The next morning I got up, still obsessing about my lopper and the branch that was obstructing the view from my as-yet-to-be-built house. I put on my cold, wet clothes from the night before, and went out into the rain to do battle. And lo! During the night the branch had broken off and was now lying in the ocean waves where the tide had come in below the tree. In the waves was also my lopper, now free, and getting ready to be carried off by the rising water. Being a thrifty New Englander, it made no sense to me not to rescue it. So I slipped and slid down the rocks, waded out into the water and retrieved the lopper, slipping only once and once again discovering that October seawater in Maine is a little brisk.

I climbed up to the top of the bank and then realized that I needed to do the whole thing over again to get my rope back, which is why, when I was finished, I was happy to retreat to the RV and have a nice, hot shower. I got dressed, felt the call of nature, looked at my soaking work coat, and realized that I wanted to put something dry on because it was a cold walk to the outhouse. Luckily I had espied my sport jacket, waiting for me on the sofa.....
