The kids at Brownville Elementary have enjoyed watching all the turkeys on the playground. We do wish they'd leave their droppings in the woods however!



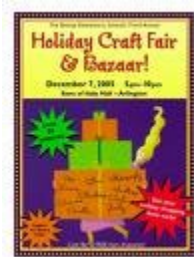
