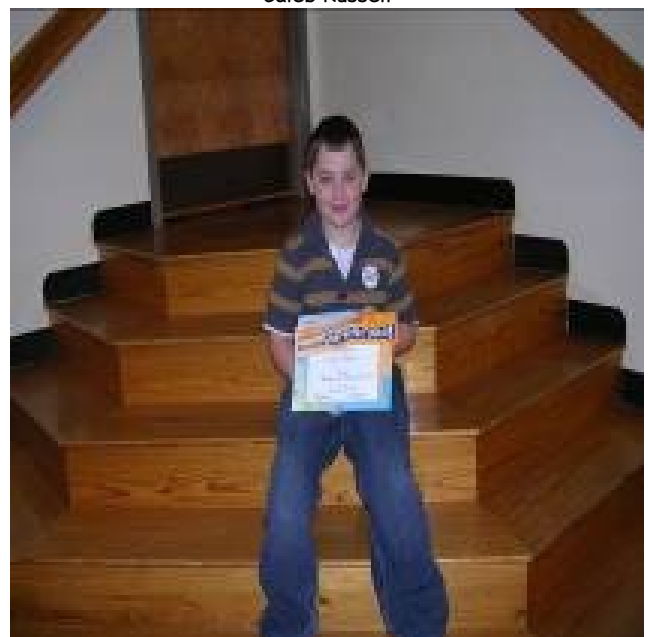

By the time you read this column, January will be over.

One month gone on the countdown to spring. We've had such a snowy and cold old-fashioned winter I'm sure spring will be early this year. We had so much snow in December, January and maybe in February that there will not be any snow left for April. What a nice change that would be to have a real spring after a real old-fashioned winter.

Our library is so useful to many different ages and groups. On Wednesday we had three BS1 workers with their little charges using the library. The three adults and three children arrived about the same time (I don't know if this was planned) and congregated in our children's area. The adults took turns reading stories to the children and everyone participated in the discussions. The three children also had a chance to socialize. Italy Part 10 By Virgil Valente

Sat. Nov. 10

Today we had a day at leisure. It was possible to take an optional tour to Genoa but some of us decided we needed a day to ourselves to relax. I had a leisurely breakfast and then Steff, Mark, Kelley and Eric and I decided to walk along the shore starting with the castle. It was still closed so we just ambled along the promenade and watched the people. A man was catching crabs off the pier. He would lower a round net next to the crab and when it crawled over the net, he would pull it up and put it in his bucket. We walked through a park and then out onto a long pier. We met a group of people who were getting ready to do some scuba diving. It was a cold day, but many of them kept their wet suits open because they were too warm in the suits.

We returned to the hotel and met up with Mary and her friend Heather. Steff and I joined them to scout the town for a place to buy souvenirs. We didn't find any. It really isn't a tourist town. We ended up going to the grocery store to buy some food for our hall party tonight. When you buy fresh vegetables in Italy you put them in a plastic bag the same as here, but you are responsible for weighing them and getting a sticker indicating the price. I didn't know that and when the cashier tried to explain it to me I didn't understand. She quickly went and did it for me. I bought some provolone picante (sharp), salamis the size of our mini hot dogs, mozzarella, sliced salami, crusty bread and fresh tomatoes. The tomatoes tasted like the ones we get from our gardens in the summer. I wish we could buy them like that here.



I returned to the room and was just about to doze off when the church bells rang indicating the beginning of siesta time at 12. I decided to wander the streets to window shop and at 2 Steff and I went back to the promenade by the sea. We watched a group of school children (yes they go to school on Saturday in Italy) play a game. They formed groups of 3 and held hands. The object of the game was to sneak up on another group and place their arms over someone in another group. If they succeeded then that person became part of the group making 4. One poor guy was much shorter than the rest and was being captured quite often. We watched them as the circles got larger and larger. Unfortunately we didn't get to see how the game ended because the teacher called them all together and they returned to the school.

We returned to the hotel where I took an hour's nap. I returned to the lobby area and met up with my nephew Bill and his wife Laura. They said they had the best hot chocolate ever and wanted to treat me to one. It tasted like a melted chocolate bar. It was very thick. I found out later they add some instant chocolate pudding to it to thicken it up.

When we got back to the hotel we found out that Vicki, one of our group from California, had just gotten word that her



son was killed on the freeway. It seems he ran out of gas and was walking to get some when he was hit. She will leave tomorrow morning at 5 to fly back.

At 6:30 Fernanda took us to a local bakery for another 'discovery' as she called them. It was a flat bread with ground chick peas for a topping. It was not something I would ever go out and buy, but some people enjoyed them. We then returned to the hotel where we had prepared for our evening meal in our room and that of Kelley and Eric across the hall. The people who went to Genoa brought back many different things they had purchased at an open market so we had quite a spread. Among other things we had 5 different kinds of cheese, many kinds of olives, panettone, and 12 liters of wine. About 30 people from the tour stopped by to munch and visit. We broke up at 10:30.
