WHAT IS THREE RIVERS KIWANIS?

THREE RIVERS KIWANIS of MILO and
BROWNVILLE is the organization that provides so many great
programs for the children in Brownville, LaGrange and Milo.

These are some of the many programs provided by
Three Rivers Kiwanis: Since reading is a very basic necessity
for all children, Kiwanis provides story books two to three
times a year to all children in SAD 41 through the 6th grade.
The Kids Korner library program is held spring and fall at the
Milo Library for grades 1,2, and 3. Summer reading material is
sent home with children. Money is provided for the
Elementary School Chorus. College book awards are given to
seniors. Funds are provided for the Elementary School Outing
Club. A bike rodeo is held each year for young children by
Kiwanians. The Key Club at Penquis Valley High School is
actually teenage Kiwanis and is supported by the Kiwanis Club.
The newly formed Builders Club was sponsored and is
financially supported by Kiwanis. The Secret Santa gift-giving
to over 100 children is a huge project of Kiwanis. Every week
a Terrific Kids program is held in the elementary schools and
this is funded by the Kiwanis. More girls are able to go to
Girls' State because of Kiwanis. Scouting also gets support
from this very dedicated organization. These are all annual
programs and, in addition, many requests are filled during the
year for unexpected needs that arise in our community.

Kiwanis has made the Arts Center at the Milo Town
Hall a place for all ages to have programs with excellent sound,
lighting, stage curtains, and seating. It has provided new
tables, both in the Arts Center and Town Hall dining room for
dinners and parties for the people in this area. The Town Hall

has become the ideal place for plays, musicals, and special events due to the work and financing of Kiwanis.

Three Rivers Kiwanis has provided the Town with a beautiful gazebo on the Sebec River at Veterans Park and has helped to beautify the park area for people to have a place for picnics and cook outs. Bands have been able to play at the gazebo and provide entertainment for the Town. Kiwanis takes care of the flowers and maintenance at the gazebo. Most recently a granite sign has been placed at the park by Kiwanis and the American Legion. Kiwanians planted shrubs and flowers to help enhance the beauty of the sign. At Christmas time we put a tree and lights in the gazebo to decorate it for the Town. The Park is becoming a very beautiful asset to our Town.

Every year Kiwanians honor our veterans with a dinner on Veterans Day and the American Legion holds a very impressive MIA/POW ceremony prior to the dinner. This has become one of the places where Veterans receive a day of great honor.

Each summer senior citizens are treated to BBQs cooked and served by Kiwanians, one at Pleasant Park in Milo, one at Quarry Pines in Brownville, one at Milo Heights, and one at Town Hall Apartments in LaGrange.

When you are reading the *Three Rivers News* do you realize that it is written, edited, printed, and distributed by Kiwanians? Many hours are spent weekly on publishing this paper and you get it by a donation or free if you wish. Not only is this paper read in our community, but it is on the trcmaine.org web site and read on computers all over the country by hundreds of people on their computer every week.

On June 19 and 20 the Three Rivers Kiwanis is holding its annual auction. This is the largest fund raiser for the Kiwanis Club, and most of the programs and projects of Kiwanis that you have just read about are made possible by the money raised at the auction. Alfond Family Boosts Milo Elementary School Playground Efforts

At a student assembly Friday, May 30th, the students of Milo Elementary School received good news about their playground. The Milo Elementary School PTO has been fundraising the past two years in an effort to begin construction on a new, safer playground for the 250 kids at Milo Elementary, but until a recent donation from Bill and Joan Alfond, a new playground wasn't in the near future. A \$10,000 donation from Bill and Joan Alfond will allow the PTO to purchase and install the first phase of a two- phase playground construction project this year.

"The students were excited to hear about the new playground equipment," says Cathy Knox, principal at Milo Elementary School. "The current playground is old, and poses safety concerns." The first phase of this playground construction project includes some ground work to level a playing field area for outdoor games and physical education instruction. This work has already begun with help from PIKE Industries, a highway construction firm. PIKE has been delivering dump truck loads of unused gravel from the Elm Street construction project. This gravel will be used to level the playing field area saving the PTO thousands of dollars in fundraising efforts.

Another component to the first phase of the playground project is to remove the wooden activity unit and construct half of a new unit made of metal. Each half of the unit cost approximately \$15,000. The \$10,000 donation made by Bill and Joan Alfond has made it possible to purchase and install the play unit this year. PTO President Karen Graham says it could have easily been another year before this half of the unit could have been possible. "Thanks to the Alfond family we will be able to give the kids new play equipment for the start of school next fall" says Graham.

The PTO would like to recognize and thank Paul Bradeen for his efforts in securing this donation. Mr. Bradeen currently works for JSI Store Fixtures and is a member of the Milo community.



Retail Alcohol Beverage Server Training Reduce Liquor Liability Insurance Premiums

Dover-Foxcroft – The Piscataquis Public Health Council, our region's Healthy Maine Partnership, will be hosting an off-premises alcohol seller server training on Thursday, June 12, 2008, 5:00 pm – 9:00 pm in the Piscataquis Room at the Resource Center, Mayo Regional Hospital. There is no cost to participate. This training will work with area retailers and their employees who sell liquor for consumption off premise.

The program will cover how to identify minors and visibly intoxicated persons, intervention to prevent a visibly intoxicated person from driving, how alcohol is ingested and metabolized by the body, what alcoholism is and how alcohol affects the body, false identification detection and good carding policy, the importance of good written serving policies and the Liquor Liability Act.

Frank Lyon, of BC Consultants, a twenty-three-year veteran of Liquor Licensing Enforcement will lead the training and is a certified instructor with the Maine Criminal Justice Academy. This training is a Maine Office of Substance Abuse approved training and will help retailers prevent costly violations and civil suits, instill more confidence in alcohol servers and potentially reduce Liquor Liability Insurance premiums (dependent upon insurance carrier approval).

Minutes of Meeting June 4, 2008

Nineteen members gathered at The Restaurant on Wednesday morning and were joined by an interclub from Dover-Foxcroft Kiwanis. Guests present also included Crystal Macomber with her father, Jim; Camille Cramer, Jessica Clement, and Haley Knowles from Builders Club and Josh Clement from Penquis Key Club.

Birthdays this week: Paul Grindle and Butch Cramer on June 4, 2008.

Communications from Kiwanis International included biographical sketches of the candidates for International office and the proposed amendments and resolutions for consideration at the 93rd Annual Kiwanis International Convention to be held in Orlando, FL June 26 - 29.

Happy & Sad Dollars were given to welcome back the Harrigans; how pretty the gazebo and the Veterans Park look; for the Red Sox doing so well and to let Paul G. know that the Yankees are in last place in their division.

Last minute details about the Sebec River Canoe Race on June 7 were discussed.

Jeremy Bousquet, new Recreation Director for Milo, filled us in on the 4th of July Celebration being planned and invited Three Rivers Kiwanis to participate. He asked specifically if we would like to rent a dunk tank and use that as a fundraiser. Volunteers were also requested. Volunteers should let Jeremy know if they can help by June 11th. Action regarding his request will be acted on at the Board Meeting to be held June 5th.

Our speaker today was William Sawtell, local historian and author. Bill gave a presentation about the Canadian Pacific "Short Line" which went through Maine, and entertained us with some interesting trivia. The "Short Line" was an outgrowth of national policy started by Prime Minister John MacDonald. The last rail of 205 miles of track in Maine was laid at Packard's Brook in Lake View in 1888 and offered the first passenger train in Maine in 1889. It got its name because it saved the Canadians 272 miles of travel up around Quebec to get to the Maritime Provinces.

One of the stories he described to us was about Axel Carlson, a legend in Brownville history, who on Dec. 12, 1912, was riding a velocipede down the tracks at the Onawa Trestle. A gust of wind blew him off the trestle and he landed in an ant hill. He broke some ribs and punctured his lung, but he crawled to safety and went to work the next day.

In 1915, the U.S. had not entered World War I, but Canada was already involved. A man named Verner Horne offered to help the Germans and was asked to blow up the tracks at the St. Croix Bridge down east, but was caught before he succeeded.

In 1917, the Canadian Pacific RR built the YMCA in Brownville Jct. It housed 42 people and included a bowling alley, table tennis, offices, and the tennis court. Bill earned \$.10 a pin to reset the pins in the bowling alley. The "Y" was torn down in 1966.

A tragic event occurred in 1919 when Canadian dignitaries boarded the CP at St. John, NB, and headed west to Quebec. On that fateful night, the westbound train collided with an eastbound train, killing 18 people. It was the largest train wreck in Maine history. The YMCA in Brownville Jct. was used as a hospital. Doctors came from surrounding towns, one of them being Doc Pritham from Greenville.

During busy times during the railroad's history, there were as many as 24 trains running during a day.

Very interesting, Bill. Thank you.
