Maine's Real Leadership Starts with Local High School Student Councils

Taking a break from presidential mudslinging, confusing school consolidation issues, and depressing gas prices...the Penquis Valley High and Middle School Student Councils and their advisors Jeremy Bousquet, Lynn Gerrish and Robbie Grant, converged at Maine Maritime Academy with other future leaders at the Maine Association of Student Council's State Convention on May 21 and 22.

The Convention provided these young leaders, who are making a difference in their schools and communities, with an outlook on the leaders of Maine today as well as the leaders of the future.

Motivational speaker and chalk artist Bob Upgren gave an entertaining presentation through his message and chalk art. A video message from Senator Susan Collins encouraging the members to continue their leadership roles through school, their communities and the work place, was shown to the 300+ student council members and their advisers.

This year's state fundraiser was for the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Maine. Penquis Valley raised \$320 toward the fundraiser, which raised a total of \$2750 across the state.

Executive board elections, exciting roundtable discussions and award presentations for councils across the state took place during this two-day event.

Penquis Valley High School Student Council was presented with awards for contributing to the state fundraiser, meeting the criteria for an Honor Council, placing first in the "Talent Show" and Advisor Lynn Gerrish was recognized as being nominated for Advisor of the Year.

Britnee Genthner was a key member in helping plan and coordinate this year's state convention. As the Eastern Maine Association of Student Council's Regional President, Britnee will be presiding over the Regional Conference that will be held at Penquis Valley on September 26, 2008. Hanna Backus, EMASC Regional Secretary will be busy compiling pamphlets and sending out notices to all the councils in the state inviting them to the conference. Student Council members from the Eastern Region as well as councils from other regions will converge on Penquis as they build their leadership skills, work together in team building and hear an exciting message from motivational speaker Ryan Moran of Indiana. "Leadership Adventures" is the 2008 - 2009 theme and Penquis Valley is ready for the adventure.

To the Citizens of MSAD #41:

As MSAD #41 looks at the process of school reorganization, it is important that you know a Regionalization Planning Committee (RFC) has been formed to work through this process which is required by law. MSAD #41 's RFC is made up of three people from each of the four district towns. Each town has a school board member (appointed by the school board chairman), a municipal representative, and a community member (appointed by town municipal leaders).

As co-chairs of the RFC, we recently attended a meeting with committee chairs and superintendents from our neighboring school units, specifically MSAD #68 (Dover-Foxcroft) and Union 60 (Greenville). These two groups have been working cooperatively on the issue of school reorganization for several months; MSAD #41 has recently joined the process.

We approached this meeting with a positive attitude, but also with our eyes wide open to the concerns we all share around this state-mandated initiative. We spoke openly and shared some of the fears citizens have about this process. We were impressed with the candor and respect shown to us, as well as the fact that members from other districts shared the same concerns as ours. The biggest concerns we all had centered around local control, local elementary schools, and the future of Penquis Valley High School and Greenville High School.

Those from MSAD #68 and Union 60 welcomed our questions, and everyone acknowledged that community issues need to be addressed in public and that the process must be transparent and open. The focus must remain on how we can best provide expanded opportunities for our students while reining in ever-escalating costs. We hope to set up public forums soon for the residents of MSAD #41 to provide the opportunity for each of you to ask the questions that you have and have those questions heard and addressed. The forums will also be set up as a way to share information across our district's communities.

In closing, we would like to reiterate the sense of community, respect, and unified values we took from this important initial meeting. We think that this process can be a positive initiative for our school system if we remain focused on what is best for our students. We will continue to ask probing questions on behalf of this district as the process moves forward.

Thank you for your continued interest in this important initiative; we will provide additional information as we work through this process.

19th Annual Cruize-In

The Penquis Cruizers, with assistance from the Milo Elementary PTO, are making final preparations for the 19th Annual Cruize-In which will be held on Sunday, June 22nd, at the JSI Store Fixtures parking lot on route 11 in Milo. The event will begin at 10am and there will be activities going on until 2pm. As always, there will be dash plaques given to all participants. Refreshments will be sold by the Three Rivers Kiwanis. Music will be provided by Tune Time DJ Service of Newport.

There will be a Bumper Ball contest and a "Rap" Contest beginning about 11am. These events are open to participants only. The auction, which is a popular part of the Cruize-In will begin at 1pm with auctioneer Norris Oakes selling items donated by area businesses and by the Cruiser members. "You can buy gift certificates from local businesses - who continue to be extremely generous to the car club," says organizer Susan Worcester, "or you can buy used car parts that haven't been part of an automobile for years and you can buy things that have nothing to do with cars." The club will also be selling raffle tickets on an "L. E. D. Tire Clock." The winning ticket will be drawn at the end of the event.

There will also be a 50-50 raffle held at the show and there will be giveaways throughout the day. This year for the first time ever members of the Central Maine Street Rod Club will be on hand, as will several area NSRA (National Street Road Association) inspectors and free NSRA inspections will be offered to any vehicle registered for the Cruize-In. This is a 23 point safety inspection - not to be confused with an official state inspection.

There will be several awards given out at the end of the day, including prizes for those people winning the contests, for a hard luck story in connection with participation in the event, for the best appearing club, for "favorite cruiser" and an NSRA Safety Award. There will also be a kids raffle (no charge to enter). This is the first year that the Milo Elementary PTO will join with the Cruizers to host the Cruize-In. For several years the Penquis Cruizers have been searching for a charitable organization in the area to work with them and the PTO stepped up this year to take on the challenge. "We hope this will be an on-going partnership," says Worcester, "as we have been hosting the show for 19 years now and are looking to step back over the next few years and allow the PTO to benefit from the show. It's a good money-maker providing the weather cooperates and the proceeds would greatly benefit the PTO's projects. We're taking the first steps toward making this event "The Annual MIlo Cruize-In sponsored by the Milo Elementary PTO."

This is also the first time that the club has had the opportunity to offer the NSRA inspections and thanks are offered to the Central Maine Street Rod Club for making this a reality.

Admission for the event is \$3 for adults. Children under 13 are admitted free if they are accompanied by an adult; \$2 is the fee if children are unaccompanied. Worcester encourages everyone interested in owning, driving, or just enjoying automobiles from classics to street rods, to muscle cars to tuners to drop in and see the cars and talk to the owners. Baton #50 Presented To Josh Clement

Phil Gerow, retired teacher after 40 years in education has made the graduation marshal's baton for the past 50 years.

Gerow began making the batons for the class of 1959 for Milo High School. The only connection he had had with a baton was when he served for the graduation class of 1954 of Husson College, where he was a student. That baton, in the college colors of green and gold, was already made for him.

As senior advisor for the MHS class of 1959, Gerow, with the help of Elaine Carey, worked a long time figuring out how to do it. Mrs. Carey supplied cardboard cylinders on which to braid the colors of black and white for MHS Forever. But Gerow had to figure out how to braid the colors. At the time he was boarding at the home of Nora and Percy Hamlin, now known as Bishop's Room Rental, operated by the couple's daughter, Joan Bishop. Over the years, Gerow has perfected his skill so now it takes him only about 4 to 5 hours to make the baton.

Milo High School batons were always "Black and White". Since the move to Penquis Valley, the baton has been done either "Red, White, and Blue", the school colors, or "Blue and White" or "Red and White", sometimes the graduating class colors.

Since the closing of the Treworgy Ben Franklin Store, the baton has been done on a one-inch, 36-inch dowel that has been donated by Bailey Lumber Company. Gerow has said he'll be teaching some one soon the art of making the baton.

Gerow was voted Class Marshal for the class of 1968, the last class to graduate from MHS before the school became part of Penquis Valley. He donated that baton to the Milo Historical Society, with autographs of the members of the class. Gerow was also a Class Marshal the year he retired.

He wishes Josh and the graduates of 2008 the very best.

Editor's Note: Mr. Gerow (he would like to be called Phil, but it is hard for us who had him as a teacher) is one of Milo's treasures. He has worked for the community in many ways, through blood drives, organizing parades and on and on. I remember him as my classes' advisor. He was and still is an inspiration and a friend. Valerie
