## Want Healthier, Happier, and More Productive Employees? Start a Worksite Wellness Program!

Starting a worksite wellness program doesn't have to be complicated or costly, but the benefits of a wellness program are substantial. Worksites that have implemented a worksite wellness program have experienced the following:

- Healthier workforce
- Increased productivity
- Improved customer service
- Decreased absenteeism
- More positive work environment
- Increased employee satisfaction

The Piscataquis Public Health Council (PPHC) has a limit of ten \$500 mini-grants available to assist small businesses of 50 or fewer employees in planning, organizing, and managing a worksite wellness program. Making healthy snacks available to employees at a reasonable cost, establishing walking routes, establishing a library of exercise DVDs and equipment, or planning a healthy activity are examples of ways a grant could be used.

If chosen to receive a grant, each business will receive help in implementing and designing a wellness program that will suit their specific needs. The business must work closely with the PPHC health educator, and should identify a minimum of 5 of the following goals to include in their wellness plan:

- Implement a healthy snacks program
- Develop and sustain a worksite wellness bulletin board
- Develop and implement a physical activity program
- Implement a worksite tobacco policy
- Implement a worksite substance abuse policy
- Participate in monthly health quizzes created by PPHC health educator
- Educate employees about health promotion and chronic disease prevention with assistance from PPHC health educator

**VERNAL POOL WORKSHOP COMING SOON**

What is a vernal pool? How do these bodies of water affect landowners dealing with wetland issues? Answers to these questions and more will be available during a half-day Vernal Pool Workshop presented by Gordon Moore of the Maine Forest Service and hosted by the Piscataquis County Soil and Water Conservation District on Saturday, April 25th.

Vernal pools are small ponds that are most obvious in the forest each spring. Some vernal pools do not meet the statutory definition of wetlands, these will be addressed during the workshop.

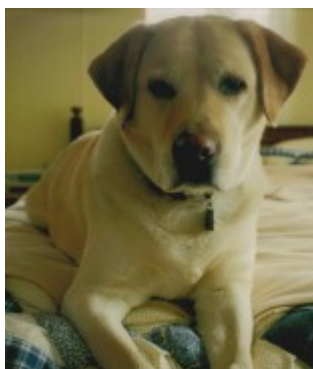
The ponds derive their name from vernalis, the Latin word for spring, because they result from various combinations of snowmelt, precipitation and high water tables associated with the spring season. The ponds tend to occur in small depressions and while many dry up in late summer, some retain water year round.

The ponds may vary greatly in terms of recharge, discharge characteristics, source of water, and geology. Those supplied by groundwater from limestone geology tend to be less acidic and be less variable in acidity. By definition, vernal pools are free of fish and can therefore support a rich community of amphibian and invertebrates that would be difficult to sustain if fish were present.

The Vernal Pool Workshop will begin at 9 a.m. at the Piscataquis County Soil and Water Conservation District (PCSWCD), in the USDA Building located at 42 Engdahl Drive, Pine Crest Business Park, Dover Foxcroft. The presentation will include a classroom segment on natural history, conservation management issues, Forestry Habitat Management Guidelines, as well as general information about wetlands. This will be followed with fieldwork at a local vernal pool. All are encouraged to bring or wear boots and warm outdoor clothing to ensure comfort during our unpredictable weather pattern.

Credits for foresters and Certified Logging Professionals will be available. Registration fee for this workshop will be \$10.00. Pre-registration is recommended by contacting us at 564-2321, extension 3.

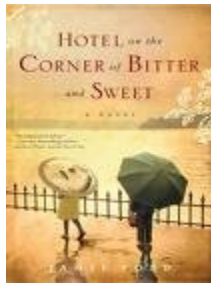

I purchased this book with gift money given in celebration of Margaret Pinette's birthday by her sister, Roberta Laverty. When we receive gift money, I try to buy books that the honorees would have liked to read themselves. This book was one of the three I chose to celebrate Margaret's birthday. When she saw it on the table in the office, she commented that she would like to read it when it was ready. I was pleased to be able to tell her that it was one of the three chosen in her name. The story takes place in Seattle in 1942 when 12-year-



old Henry Lee meets Keiko Okabe. He is Chinese and she is of Japanese descent. Henry's father considers the Japanese deadly enemies of his people due to previous atrocities, and makes it hard for Henry to be friends with Keiko. Eventually Keiko's family is moved to a concentration camp. The author moves the story between the war year of 1942 and a present of 1986. Events are historical, but the characters are fictional. The author is the great-grandson of Nevada mining pioneer Min Chung who emigrated in 1865 from Kaiping, China, to San Francisco. The author grew up near Seattle's Chinatown so he is quite familiar with the background he used in his novel. Last week I lamented that I didn't know if I'd soon find another book that I liked as well as Jeffrey Archer's Paths of Glory. In the Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet I can say that I have.
