Apparently the info below is a standard procedure all paramedics follow at the scene of an accident when they come across your cell phone.

ICE - 'In Case of Emergency'

We all carry our mobile phones with names & numbers stored in its memory but nobody, other than we ourselves, knows which of these numbers belong to our closest family or friends.

If we were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending us would have our mobile phone but wouldn't know who to call. Yes, there are hundreds of numbers stored, but which one is the contact person in case of an emergency? Hence this 'ICE' (In Case of Emergency) Campaign.

The concept of 'ICE' is catching on quickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell(mobile) phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted during emergency under the name 'ICE' (In Case Of Emergency).

The idea was thought up by a paramedic who found that when he went to the scenes of accidents, there were always mobile phones with patients, but they didn't know which number to call. He therefore thought that it would be a good idea if there was a nationally recognized name for this purpose. In an emergency situation, emergency service personnel and hospital staff would be able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialing the number you have stored as 'ICE.' For more than one contact name simply enter ICE1, ICE2 and ICE3 etc. A great idea that will make a difference! Let's spread the concept of ICE by storing an ICE number in our Mobile phones today!

Milo Free Public Library News

This column has a lot of news today from far and near. Pam Flanagan, our assistant, has returned from her 10-day trip to London. She had a great time and good weather. She traveled over with her sister, Rebecca, and they stayed at the apartment of a friend, Stephen Dean, very close to the center of London. Pam spoke of the excitement of riding on the 2nd story of London's double decker buses. Sometimes they were able to sit right up front, which they really enjoyed. Pam and Becky also enjoyed full English breakfasts and pub meals. Pam found London a clean city and the people polite.

As we visited these last few days since her return, she raved about several tourist spots often. She and Becky took a tour to Stonehenge which was impressive, but a half hour ride beyond that stone circle they toured the older and larger stone circle of Avebury. I had never heard of that stone circle so she brought it up for me on the internet. I was impressed as she and Becky had been. It is the largest stone circle in the world and covers 28 acres. The large outer circle is 1401 feet in diameter. There are also two inner circles each over 300 feet in diameter. Originally there were 98 standing stones, some weighing more than 40 tons. Some of the stones are now missing. How was it ever built? In the center of this huge circle is a village with a road running through it. Unlike Stonehenge, the stones here are very rough and the oldest stones are thought to have been placed in 2800 B.C.



Stephen's apartment is near Regent's Park, which Becky and Pam visited daily. They were very impressed with the Rose Garden, which had 84 formal beds and 80 varieties of roses.

The pubs they visited had their own history. The Lamb and Flag Pub is the oldest pub in London, and the Olde Cheshire Cheese, rebuilt in 1667, had been a watering hole for Charles Dickens, Samuel Johnson, Mark Twain, Teddy Roosevelt and other notables.

Pam and her sister visited the Tower of London and viewed the spectacular crown jewels. She spoke of a moving platform that kept the viewer moving slowly but continuously past the display cases. She thought the moving belt kept viewers from getting finger prints ,etc., on the glass cases.

Another tourist site at which they marveled was the London Eye (also known as the Millennium Wheel built in 1998-1999). It is a huge Ferris wheel-443 feet high. It is the tallest Ferris wheel in Europe and the most popular paid tourist attraction in the United Kingdom. It is visited by over 3 million people a year. The entire structure is supported by an A-frame on one side only. It is used as an observation wheel, and the capsules appear to have mostly glass walls to the floor of the car. Each capsule can hold 24 people who are able to stroll around the car. As I looked at one of the internet pictures of a capsule, I noticed a sign reading, "Do not lean against the door." I guess I wouldn't go anywhere near the door. It does not usually stop but goes so slowly, passengers can walk on and off at ground level. The ride takes 30 minutes, but Pam and her sister did not feel they had the time, so did not ride. Pam told me folks get married in the capsules at the top and, I'm sure this is a London guide joke, "It's all downhill from then on." We are all very glad to have Pam back on this side of the Pond and back in the library.

We had a busy Wednesday afternoon with the first Kiwanis Kids Korner session in nearly a year. Val was helped by Heidi Finson and Frank Cochrane. Kiwanis President, George Barton and his wife Jan , and Josh Clement, Key Club member, was also helping. There were 25 children present to enjoy juice boxes and crackers with cheese or peanut butter. The Gulps, a story of food nutrition, was read by Val. The youngest Kiwanis Kid ever (just kidding, he was only a visitor) was Gavin, age 1 week, who attended with his mother, Natalie Hitchcock, and older siblings. It was fun to welcome the Kids again, to meet the newest ones and to see the helpers, old and new. Needless to say, it was a lively afternoon as the new Kids learned about the library and everyone had fun together.

A Bit of Veteran's History

A member of Joseph P. Chaisson American Legion Post 41 for 21 years shares some memories of his part in World War II. Bob joined the United States Army Air Corp on July 20th, 1940. Upon completion of basic training, he attended aircraft maintenance schooling and then became an instructor on aircraft repair. On December 7th, 1941, he was stationed in Panama when the word came down about the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor. They became concerned as the Panama Canal would be a very important control point for any world war; however, Bob was reassigned to the Eight Air Force in Great Britain the journey beginning on a Liberty Ship used as a troop carrier and traveling in a convoy protected by U. S. Navy destroyers and anti-sub ships. Pipe rack bunks with canvas bottoms stacked several high

provided sleeping quarters. "You couldn't sit up as the racks were too narrow; [we had to] crawl in and out". The racks had to be shared as there were more troops than racks. Many of the troops became seasick during the voyage that lasted ten days and the threat of German submarines was constantly on their minds.

In Great Britain Bob worked primarily on B17 bomber repairs for planes that had made belly landings and during a time when Germany was experimenting with the "Buzz Bomb". It was a jet propelled unmanned bomb that sound like a jet plane. "When you could hear it you were fine as it flew by". "One incident I was walking on the tarmac when a buzz bomb struck the rear portion of a Quonset hut blowing out the end that housed the officer's



quarters. The blast blew me off my feet. No one was in the officer's quarters at the time and no one was harmed".

Bob was honorably discharged in August, 1945, and returned to the Milo area. In 2008 Bob was honored as a Memorial Day Parade Marshal and remains active in the community.


