

A MILITARY MOMENT

General Earle E. Partridge retired July 21, 1959. He was a major player for the Army Air Corps during World War II and the newly formed Air Force commanding the Fifth Air Force in Korea. As a four-star general his last assignment was Commander of the North American Air Defense Command. As a member of the United States Air 100th Security Squadron (Air Force Honor Guard) of Bolling Air Force Base, I was honored to be selected as General



Partridge's personal flag bearer during his retirement parade on Bolling Air Force Base. My duty assignment was to hold and handle the four star flag during the ceremony, standing directly behind



General Partridge at the reviewing stand. The reviewing party consisted of James H. Douglas, Secretary of the Air Force, General Nathan Twining, chairman of Joint Chiefs of Staff and General Thomas D. White, Air Force Chief of staff.

The parade consisted of joint services, Army, Marine,



Navy and Air Force Honor Guards, plus the Air Force Drum and Bugle Corp.

That evening a reception was held at the Bolling Air Force Officer's Club and along with other members of the Air Force Honor Guard, we provided valet service for all that attended the reception so we had an opportunity to meet some of these dignitaries up close. Just another military moment to remember.

Milo Free Public Library News

To continue the library story, on Tuesday Sept. 15 we began phase 2. It was the opposite of phase 1 in that all furniture and books had to be moved to the front of the room. The computer table and circulation desk were set into their original places as was the first book stack nearest the office door. Thankfully we did not have to worry about carrying things to the basement. The radiators were the biggest (and heaviest) problem. The one in the middle of the room had to



be moved. Eventually several men got it into position behind the circulation desk using rollers and a crowbar. Thank heavens for the men in our crew. Ladies, this may sound sexist, but men are stronger than women and have a good sense of spatial relationship. With their ingenuity they moved a lot of furniture quickly as we ladies waited for our turn to begin moving books again.

At this time several of our male workers looked at the 8 stacks at the back wall and decided that a better idea was not to move them. Jeff (town manager) and Jim Drinkwater (he happened to be working at the town hall) were called in, and the men discussed the possibility of tiling as close as possible under the back stacks without moving them. Jim would cut tiles to fit around the stack legs. Now, you astute readers have figured out that we needn't have bothered to remove the books from the 8 stacks in the beginning, and you would have been right. But remember, I don't move a library very often so I can be forgiven a few errors in judgment.

Again old tiles were removed, new tiles were laid and John again sealed and waxed the rest of the new floor. Shaun Pomerleau (I found out who had done the painting) painted the rest of the walls, and the larger part of the library renovation was finished. Hurray! But wait, I needed a crew again to get everything back into place. This time we did the final move on Saturday, Sept. 19, in order to be able to open on Monday, September 21st. When I got into the library on Saturday morning, the radiators were not hooked up, which meant we could not move several bookcases into their final position due to having to leave room for the service men to work. I called McKusick, but you know the story, no men available on Saturday. I was promised the job would be done early Monday. This was fine; we'd work around it, and my crew did just that. All possible furniture was back in place by noon. Great! The men left. Their job was done, but several women came back after lunch to begin to put books in place. This is a big job when one has to move books before one can begin to shelve books.

There were no servicemen from McKusick early Monday morning. No service men had been here when I came back from an appointment at 11:00. A tall 8 ft. metal book stack standing in the middle of the room was not convenient and maybe dangerous. Before it could be moved, the radiators had to be hooked up. I called McKusick, told them of the situation and explained that we were opening today at 2:00. The man I was speaking to said he'd get a crew over and he did. They finished hooking the radiators up by 1:30! Two of our men came in later and replaced the book shelves. Now we were back together except for boxes of books everywhere, of course.
