## Milo Free Public Library News

What an early winter today (Thursday). We actually saw a dull sun this morning as Vi and I walked in the cemetery, and this line did pop into my head, "The sun that brief December ( I replaced December with November) day, rose cheerless over hills of gray". John Greenleaf Whittier caught the feeling exactly. The sun quickly disappeared and then there was light snow, then heavier snow. I had vaguely heard a brief notice about snow on the radio Saturday but as no one else seemed to have heard it, I hoped they were right.

This early white stuff has reminded me that I have been remiss in reminding our patrons about winter closings. When there is inclement weather, especially snow, but ice flooding---any extremely bad weather, the library staff could be told by the powers that be to close early or not even to open at all. If there is stormy weather please call the library or listen to Q106.5 or Channel 5. Robin, in the town office, will put the notices of changes in our schedule on the media. If it is already library hours, call the library to see if we are open. Let the phone ring several times. We usually answer quickly but there are times when it is not always possible. If we don't answer after several rings, we probably aren't open. I have been making this announcement annually for several years now, and we have been very pleased to see that patrons now often call on snowy days to check if we are open. We're so glad that library users have gotten the message, and don't make a needless trip to a closed library in bad weather.

Today (I'm typing this on Friday) actually starts our new Friday library hours. Pam and I opened at 1:00 and were pleased to have 6 patrons in during the first hour. We hope the early opening is convenient for many and inconvenient for no one. Just for our own interest and to present to the trustees, we will keep a record of how many come in from 1:00-2:00 for the next few weeks. Several patrons have expressed an interest for being able to get on to the computers during pre-teen time or for being in town and able to come into the library earlier. Please be sure to mention our new library hours to friends who may not have seen the notices around in the Kiwanis paper, in the town hall or in the stores.

By early October the main part of the library collection was back in place. Most patrons were having no problem finding the recent fiction they wanted or even browsing through the stacks. Due to waiting for a broken window to be replaced, our "K" books resided in boxes for a few weeks. However, now the window is fixed, the bookcase is back in place and so are all the "K" author books. However, there are always the odds and ends. There are a number of books that were donated just before the move and were set aside hurriedly to be processed (or not) later. There were also books put on tables (one upstairs and one downstairs) until we know whether we want to keep them or whatever (older paperbacks but with popular titles of 20 years or so ago). Pam and I have started to look these books over and make choices. We are really scrutinizing the paperbacks and have discovered several are broken (discard without worry), many too have very brown brittle pages and tiny print (more easy decisions). As we make the decisions and discard the flotsam and jetsam our library shelves will be brighter and more useful.

I put in another book order on Tuesday. I was astonished to see another James Patterson book, I, Alex Cross. When I expressed my surprise to a library patron, she said she had

heard he was working on as many as 70 books. Amazing! Books by Stephen King, Thomas Kinkade, Sue Henry and Dean Koontz will also be here in a few days. I also have good news for patrons who have asked about the latest Sue Grafton. I noticed her next book, U is for Undertow is listed in the latest book catalog to be released in December. We have waited a long time for this title.

Lillian Smith, a representative of the Piscataquis Public Health Council and the Education Department at Mayo Regional Hospital cancer prevention program, was present to speak at our meeting today. The topic today was early detection of Colon/Rectal cancer. Colon cancer is the 2<sup>nd</sup> leading killing cancer and is the most detectable and treatable when found in the early stages. The cancer usually starts with a polyp that can be detected during a screening process.

There are four types of screening. One is fecal blood testing, a coloscopy, a colonoscopy, and recently a virtual tour of the colon that is less invasive. The Maine legislature has required that health insurance providers have to cover the cost of colon screenings in the state of Maine. We would like to thank Lillian for speaking at our meeting today and encourage anyone 50 or older to have a screening, especially anyone who has a high fat diet, low exercise, smokes, or are heavy users of alcohol.

### Maine CDC/DHHS Update on Novel Influenza A (H1N1) Virus November 5, 2009 Increased Flu Activity in Maine and the US

The 2009 H1N1 flu continues to be widespread in Maine, more widespread than we have seen in years, as it is in nearly all other states. This was anticipated, and Maine CDC has been working for months to make sure we have resources in place to prevent and treat the flu.

In the past week, there have been increases in visits to health care providers for influenza-like illness (ILI) and increases in school absences. There have been 24 new outbreaks of ILI in K-12 schools and one in a university. Although the majority of outbreaks occurred in Kennebec and Penobscot counties, there were also outbreaks in Androscoggin, Aroostook, Franklin, Lincoln, Oxford, Somerset, Washington, and York counties.

There were 10 people hospitalized due to H1N1, nearly all of whom have been discharged. Four of the hospitalized patients were otherwise healthy children; one was a young adult; and five were middle-aged adults. The first cases of H1N1 in Franklin County were reported this week. There have now been confirmed cases of H1N1 in every county in Maine. Although the vast majority of people are not getting tested and do not need to, almost 300 people were tested and confirmed as having H1N1. Most of these were children.

People should assume that they will be exposed to the flu at some point, and with only enough vaccine for 1 in 10 people in Maine right now, we should all take precautions to prevent serious illness:

- Stay home if you are sick, until you are fever-free for a full 24 hours without taking fever-reducing medicine.
- Cough and sneeze into your elbow, or into a tissue. Throw this tissue away.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water, but especially after coughing and sneezing. Alcohol-based hand gels can also be used.
- Avoid touching your nose, mouth, and eyes. Germs can be spread by touching contaminated surfaces and then touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Avoid contact with sick people. If you are at very high risk for complication, you may want to avoid large crowds.
- If and when vaccine is available, consider getting both seasonal and H1N1 flu vaccines.
- Contact your health care provider if there are flu-like symptoms in a household where anyone is younger than 2 years old, 65 years or older, pregnant, and/or has an underlying medical condition. There are prescription medicines (antivirals such as Tamiflu®) that may help.
- Although most people can stay home without seeing a health care provider, anyone with the flu should seek medical attention for:
  - o Dehydration
  - o Trouble breathing
  - o Getting better, then suddenly getting a lot worse
  - o Any major change in one's condition
