The Forgotten Garden is a very complex book with a compelling story that jumps back and forth from 1913 to recent years chapter by chapter, but the time is clearly designated by date. I had read it 7 months before the meeting and was not able to review it, but was able to participate in the discussion fairly well as much of the book was unforgettable. The first page begins the story of 4-year-old Ivory in England who is settled in a hiding place on the deck of a ship and told not to come out until Eliza comes back for her. Ivory remains hidden very patiently, but the ship, bound for Australia, begins to move, and Eliza never comes back. Ivory is adopted by an Australian couple who change her name to Nel, but when she becomes an adult she is determined to find out more about her birth parents in England. Ivory/Nel's story is incredible as we also learn many details about England in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, about the extreme poverty and early medicine. The author has done a marvelous job of detailing the background of the
