

As I sit here looking out at a lovely winter day I am thankful to live in Maine. Folks speak about the cold and the snow, but this has been a pleasant winter. Yes, we've had snow but not outstanding amounts at any one time, and actually, not many storms. I am pleased that patrons think to call ahead to check if the library is in operation. On days that it has snowed, we will often have 2-3 calls to see if the library is open. We are glad that folks have gotten the message. Here are more reasons that I'm glad I live in Maine. We do not have to worry about horrendous earthquakes, tornadoes that do devastating damage or even large snowstorms and heavy winds causing drifts that strand folks in their cars for days such as they get out in the Midwest at times. Even many places in the "sunny South" had very cold temperatures and snow this winter. I'm glad I live in Maine.

I haven't mentioned this information this year, but we do have magazines to borrow. They can be borrowed for two weeks just as our books are borrowed. Why pay high prices for magazines when you can borrow them from your library? [The Piscataquis Observer](#) is also available.
